- Driver's License
- Passport
- Military ID
- School-Issued ID

The Rules of the Road

Rider must comply with all traffic regulations, including yielding the right-of-way to a pedestrian and making an audible signal before overtaking a pedestrian or another rider.

No Modifications

The ordinance also makes it illegal for E-bike owners to modify the bike to exceed state-defined speed limits on streets, sidewalks, or paths. It also prohibits the removal of pedals from an E-bike.

NEW E-BIKE ORDINANCE



NEW E-BIKE RULES IN PALM COAST

E-bikes are a great way to get around, but safety comes first. To protect riders and our community, Palm Coast adopted new e-bike rules on October 7, 2025.

These rules help prevent crashes, keep sidewalks and trails safe, and help make sure young riders are ready to handle e-bikes responsibly.

WHAT'S NEW

Minimum Age: Riders must be 11 or older to use an e-bike in public areas.

ID Required: All riders must carry a government-issued photo ID or a school ID and must present it to law enforcement if requested.

Fines & Enforcement: Fines up to \$100 per violation. Improper off-road e-bikes may be impounded.

These rules promote safe and responsible riding, ensuring that everyone follows the same standards.

RIDE SMART. RIDE SAFE.



Wear a helmet. Protect your head — no excuses.



Eyes up, ears open — no headphones, no phone, no distractions.



Slow down in busy areas, especially near schools, parks, and crosswalks



One rider per bike. No extra passengers — it's unsafe.



Use lights or reflective clothing at dusk or dark. Be seen by drivers and walkers.



Watch the weather. Rain makes roads slick and braking harder.



Follow all traffic laws. Remember to stop at stop signs and signals.



Lock your e-bike. Prevent theft when you're not riding.



Parents: Do a practice ride. Go over braking, turning, and checking traffic before kids ride solo.

Speed doesn't equal skill — practice braking, turning, and balance before riding in busy areas.

WHAT ARE E-BIKES?

A bicycle with an electric motor that assists with pedaling or propels it forward, providing extra power to the rider.

There are Three Classes of E-bikes:

- Class 1: Pedal assist only, with no throttle, and a maximum of 20 mph.
- Class 2: Throttle-assisted with a maximum speed of 20 mph.
- Class 3: Pedal-assist only, with no throttle, and a maximum assisted speed of 28 mph.
